



ABOUT THE KOBZAR[™] BOOK AWARD

The Ukrainian community proudly celebrates over 130 years in Canada and the Ukrainian stories are countless. Recognizing the need to document and share these stories, the Ukrainian Canadian Foundation of Taras Shevchenko, inspired by the vision and leadership of its president Andrew Hladyshevsky, created the KOBZAR[™] Literary Award in 2003.

Presented every two years, the \$25,000 KOBZAR[™] Book Award recognizes outstanding contributions to Canadian literature by Canadian authors who write on universal themes through a Ukrainian Canadian lens.

KOBZAR[™] Book Award entries can weave through fascinating moments in world history, acquaint us with the lives of both one and the many, introduce us to the challenges of different generations and waves of immigration. Ultimately, they paint a picture of a people that proudly continues to shape the Canada we know today.

Genres include literary non-fiction, fiction, poetry, young readers' literature, play, screenplay, and musical. Distinctive to this Award is monetary recognition for both the winner (\$20,000) and the winner's publisher (\$5,000).

The KOBZAR[™] Book Award is at the core of the Foundation's literary arts program chaired until 2018 by Dr. Christine Turkewych. Engaging with authors, emerging writers, and publishers, the program introduced the KOBZAR[™] Literary Award to the Canadian literary arts community including avid writers and readers alike.

To encourage young and emerging writers to pursue their passion and share their stories, the Foundation offered writers' workshops across Canada featuring KOBZAR[™] award winners and established Canadian writers.

In 2018, the name of the award was changed to KOBZAR[™] Book Award to better reflect the works being submitted for award consideration.

In 2020, the Emerging Writers Short Prose Competition was introduced setting the groundwork for new writers to explore the short prose form and to one day aspire to submit an entry to the KOBZAR[™] Book Award.

All the lavish ceremonies through 2020 were organized by a team of dedicated volunteers led for seven of those events by Alla Shklar, while the most recent in 2020 was chaired by Janice Taskey.



The 2020 KOBZAR[™] Book Award ceremony marked a shift in the program's evolution. The time had come for the award to be introduced to new audiences. As such, it bid farewell to Toronto embarking on a national journey. It was also one of the last public events prior to a two-year pandemic lockdown and in 2022 is one of the last virtual events as pre-pandemic activities resume. The 2022 ceremony originally scheduled to be held in person at the Winnipeg Art Gallery was instead filmed at the Art Gallery. The 2022 ceremony is also being held after a short pause during an unprovoked war that is ravaging Ukraine – the homeland of both our ancestors and many members of the Ukrainian community in Canada; the root of Ukrainian strength, passion and creativity. As a foreign aggressor attempts to eliminate all traces of the Ukrainian identity, the stories celebrated with the KOBZAR[™] Book Award take on even greater significance documenting the history of Ukrainian culture in Canada.

Ukrainians have come a long way – from the first immigrants who came to Canada and persevered to be accepted to the powerful unified community that today shapes Canadian policies and engages the Canadian cultural community in support of the Ukrainian identity.

The KOBZAR[™] Book Award will continue to provide a space for Canadian storytellers to celebrate the Ukrainian Canadian story in all its diversity.


A leading figure in the Winnipeg culture, politics, and creative communities, Terry plays an active role in telling the stories of Canada's diverse people,

ENEMY ALIEN: A TRUE STORY OF LIFE BEHIND BARBED WIRE By Kassandra Luciuk, Illustrated by nicole marie burton Between the Lines 2020




DR. KASSANDRA LUCIUK is an Assistant Professor in the Department of History at Dalhousie University. She is the author of several books and articles on the Ukrainian experience in Canada, including "Reinserting Radicalism: Canada's First National Internment Operations, the Ukrainian Left, and the Politics of Redress," in *Civilian Internment in Canada: Histories and Legacies*.

Her work explores how changing notions of Canadian citizenship interacted with ethnic identity during the Cold War. In a broader sense, her research interests include Canada, migration/ethnicity, state formation, and nationalism.

Kassandra was awarded the 2020 Jean-Marie Fecteau Prize by the Canadian Historical Association.

Illustrator **NICOLE MARIE BURTON** is a US-born, Ontario-based artist and entrepreneur of Jewish-Ukrainian descent. Her work as an illustrator, publisher and educator focuses on comics with social justice themes, ranging in topics from Canadian history to the science of climate change. Enemy Alien is her second full-length graphic novel.





ENEMY ALIEN: A TRUE STORY OF LIFE BEHIND BARBED WIRE

tells the story of Canada's first national internment operations through the eyes of John Boychuk, an internee held in Kapuskasing from 1914 to 1917. The story is based on Boychuk's actual memoir, which is the only comprehensive internee testimony in existence. This graphic history follows Boychuk from his arrest in Toronto to Kapuskasing, where he spends just over three years, and subsequently traces Boychuk's parole, his search for work, his attempts to organize a union, and his ultimate settlement in Winnipeg.

FIELDS OF LIGHT AND STONE By Angeline Schellenberg University of Alberta Press 2020




ANGELINE SCHELLENBERG is a poet and micro-fiction writer in Treaty 1 territory (Winnipeg). Her collection about raising children on the autism spectrum, *Tell Them It Was Mozart* (Brick Books, 2016), won three Manitoba Book Awards and was a finalist for a ReLit Award for Poetry. Her chapbooks are *Roads of Stone* (The Alfred Gustav Press), *Dented Tubas* (Kalamalka Press), *Blue Moon, Red Herring* (JackPine Press), and *Irises* (Dancing Girl Press). The Pushcart nominee has performed her poetry

from Victoria to Halifax, including in Riding Mountain National Park as Deep Bay artist-in-residence. With a love for encouraging fellow writers, Angeline hosts Speaking Crow, Winnipeg's longest-running poetry open mic. Having earned a Master of Arts in Biblical Studies, she is currently training as a spiritual director. An amateur photographer and potter, Angeline lives with her husband, two children, and rescue dogs. *Fields of Light and Stone* (University of Alberta Press, 2020) is her latest book.

FIELDS OF LIGHT AND STONE explores the influence on the author's life of her Mennonite grandparents. Her elegiac love letter to them articulates her grief against the backdrop of their involuntary emigration from Ukraine and Russia. She artfully captures the immigrant identity vital to Canadian culture in poems that draw on events both personal and global: war and famine, dementia and cancer, hidden sacrifice and secrets. Her poems captivate with themes of ancestry, memory, resilience, and forgiveness. *Fields of Light and Stone* is a reflection on how family history shapes and moves us.

GOOD CITIZENS NEED NOT FEAR By Maria Reva Knopf Canada 2020



MARIA REVA writes fiction and opera libretti. Maria's writing has appeared in *The Atlantic, McSweeney's, The Wall Street Journal, Granta,* and *The Best American Short Stories.* She won a National Magazine Award in 2019 and was a finalist for the Writers' Trust of Canada 2020 Fiction Prize.

Her current musical collaborations include an opera with composer Anna Pidgorna (developed by Musique 3 Femmes in Montreal), as well as a song cycle with Shelley Marwood. Past collaborations include an opera libretto for ERATO Ensemble, texts for Vancouver International Song

Institute's Art Song Lab, and a script for City Opera Vancouver.

Maria was born in Ukraine and grew up in New Westminster, British Columbia. She received her MFA from the Michener Center for Writers at the University of Texas.

GOOD CITIZENS NEED NOT FEAR has

a cast of unforgettable characters—citizens of the small industrial town of Kirovka—that populate Maria Reva's ingeniously entwined tales that span the chaotic years leading up to and immediately following the fall of the Soviet Union in 1989. Weaving the strands of the narrative together is an unforgettable, chameleon-like young woman named Zaya: an orphan turned beauty-pageant crasher who survives the extraordinary circumstances of her childhood through a compelling combination of ferocity, intelligence, stubbornness, and wit.

She is the author of *Little Fortress* (Wolsak & Wynn, 2019), the best-selling novel *The Sudden Weight of Snow* (McClelland & Stewart, 2002), and four critically acclaimed, award-winning collections of poetry. Her recent collection *Our Familiar Hunger* (Nightwood, 2018) won the 2020 KOBZAR[™] Book Award, the Blue Heron Poetry Prize, and the Acorn-Plantos Poetry Award. Her work has also been nominated for several awards, including the Amazon/Books in Canada First Novel Award, the Pat Lowther Award, and three times for the CBC Poetry Prize.



Kerry Clare is a National Magazine Award-nominated writer, editor of The M Word: Conversations About Motherhood, and author of two novels, *Mitzi Bytes* and *Waiting for a Star to Fall*. She teaches blogging at MyBlogSchool.ca, is editor of the Canadian books website 49thShelf.com, and has been a blogger for twenty years, currently at PickleMeThis.com.



KOBZAR[™] BOOK AWARD SCULPTURE

The KOBZAR[™] Book Award is named for the travelling 19th-century minstrel wanderers, "Kobzars," who narrated and sang a repertoire of historic epics, religious and folk songs, and stories of the day to the instrumental accompaniment of a bandura or kobza.



The original KOBZAR Literary Award was a limited-edition miniature cast of a bronze sculpture by the internationally renowned artist Leo Mol.

LEO MOL was a Ukrainian Canadian stained-glass artist, painter, and sculptor. The Leo Mol Sculpture Garden officially opened in Winnipeg's Assiniboine Park in 1992, attracting visitors from around the world and enriching the cultural life of Winnipeg.

After the 2018 awarding and the adoption of a new name, a new design was created by award-winning sculptor Oleh Lesiuk.

OLEH LESIUK works in sculpture, monumental sculpture, and painting. A graduate of the Lviv National Academy of Applied Arts and Decorative Arts, Oleh Lesiuk has been creating sculptures and monuments since 1981. His works are found in Ukraine, USA, Canada, France, and Great Britain.



EMERGING WRITERS SHORT PROSE COMPETITION

In 2019, the Shevchenko Foundation launched the Emerging Writers Short Prose Competition to encourage and promote new authors who write on a topic with a tangible connection to the Ukrainian Canadian experience. The annual prize is awarded to a Canadian writer for the best piece of unpublished English language prose of up to 1,500 words.

The Foundation encourages submissions that reflect fresh perspectives, a diversity of experiences, and an ongoing evolution of our cultural experiences. The Competition sets the groundwork for new writers to explore the short prose form and to one day aspire to submit an entry to the KOBZAR[™] Book Award.

The author of the winning entry receives a \$1500 prize. An additional \$1,000 is made available to assist with publication of the winning entry in a Canadian newspaper, magazine or recognized digital distributor, for promotion of the story and the author's development as a writer.
